### TEACHING TIP

A total physical response activity is perfect to use when practicing imperatives. Teachers may wish to play the children's game called "Simon Says" with commands. The teacher will say the following commands and direct each to a student, using his/her name. If Simon has said this and the student performs the action correctly, the student stays in the game. If Simon has not said the command or the student does not perform the command correctly, the student is out of the game. Some examples follow for the teacher's convenience.

• Simon dicit, "Discēde!"	Simon dicit, "Discēdite!"
• "Respondē 'minimē!'"	"Respondēte, 'minimē!'"
• Simon dicit, "Movē caput!"	Simon dicit, "Movēte capita!"
• "Ambulā!"	"Ambulāte!"
• "Fuge!"	"Fugite!"
• Simon dicit, "Venī ad mē!"	Simon dicit, "Venite ad mē!"
• "Da magistrō (magistrae) crētam!"	"Date magistrō (magistrae) crētam!"
• Simon dicit, "Iacē!"	Simon dicit, "Iacēte!"
• "Manē!"	"Manēte!"
• "Intrā!"	"Intrāte!"
• Simon dicit, "Tenē librum!"	Simon dicit, "Tenēte librōs!"
• Simon dicit, "Pōne in mēnsā librum!"	Simon dicit, "Pōnite in mēnsā librōs!"
